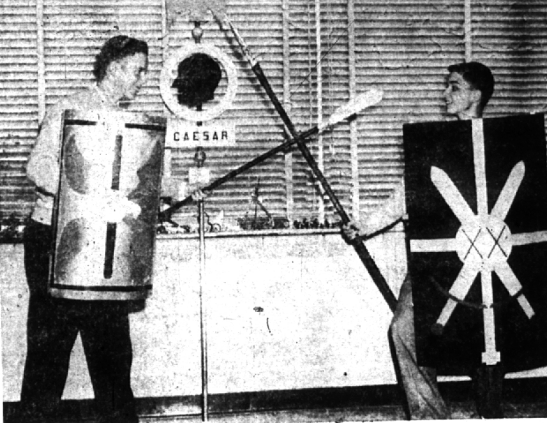
Senior display cases have been exhibited during the entire year by Nina Slawson, Mary Collins, Ed Leavenworth and their committee.

# Latin Students Create A Classroom Museum

As they say in Latin, "labor ipse voluptas," (work itself is a pleasure) and that seems to be the case among Latin students of Mrs. Hazel Ladd at Birmingham high school.

One glance around the room, and, ino facto, you know the students' work must have been a pleasure for them, because they did so much of it.

Work in this case consists of models of Roman structures, soldiers, war implements and ships, to name a few, which students made in connection with their study of Caesar and his wars.

**EVEN LIFE-SIZE** replicas were made by some of the students, as in the case of the large shields, standards and spears which line the back of the room.

Result of the students' work project is a veritable museum of Roman history, adding color and interest to the classroom.

So unusual and well-executed are the projects that Mr. Lawrence Sauvage, Baldwin school teacher, recently brought his sixth graders to the high school to see the display.

**THE VISITORS** got into the spirit of things immediately, for they passed "under the yoke" as they entered the classroom door, bowing under the yoke of three spears made by the Latin students.

Among items the students saw displayed along the wide window ledges was an exact miniature of a Roman ship by Allen Henning.

Near it was a scene from the Cassian war, "sub jugum," in which Mary Roberts recreated a scene showing pipe-cleaner figures being marched under a yoke by Roman soldiers.

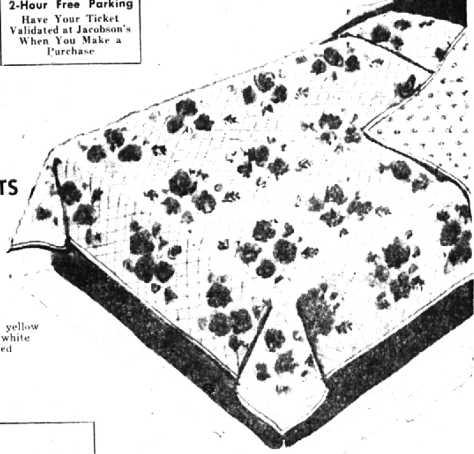
