He did list three items that his 30-family association did favor.

The three points were:

1. A city manager plan which would provide an experienced head for the government.
2. Election of councilmen at large.
3. Election of councilmen on an alternating basis so only two of these councilmen would be leaving at any one time, thereby retaining some experience on the council.

LAWRENCE A. FIFERLICK, 24593 Kingsl, president of Southfield Federation of Associations, invited the commissioners to a meeting of his 15-association group May 21 at Southfield high school.

Termining Southfield's political situation "chaotic," Fiferlick said, "What we want most is to get this problem of incorporation cleared up. It's costing us money and time."

He asked for provisions of amending the charter without too many complications. "A flood is coming — out of Detroit," said Fiferlick, adding that Southfield had to be ready to meet that flood of new residents.

"FRANKLIN and places like that in another 10 years are going to be a thing of the past," said Fiferlick. "I'll accept it (a charter tonight — knowing you," he added. Ray McLeod, 29552 Van Buren, unsuccessful charter candidate, asked the commission to consider, carefully the items which led to the defeat of the last charter and requested more public meetings to discuss the charter after it is completed.

He asked for a taxation committee to determine what additional tax revenues will be received over what Southfield is now entitled to, and what the minimum costs of operating a city will be.

"When the tax figure is set, have figures to back up your statements," said McLeod.

CHARLES SHULL, 32750 Bellvue trail, president of Berkshire Hills Association, located between Evergreen and Lahser north of 13 Mile, said his group had not been polled and he could not speak for them, but he personally would like to see new boundaries for City of Southfield, implying that the Berkshires should be left out of the city. "I know it can't be done," Shull concluded.

Maurice R. Geisel, 29150 Shari-dale, represented Buckland Protective association in the triangle bounded by 12 Mile, Inkster and Northwestern highway, "more or less the forgotten corner," said Geisel.

He wanted concrete charter provisions for zoning. "We need something to protect ourselves with," Geisel concluded.
