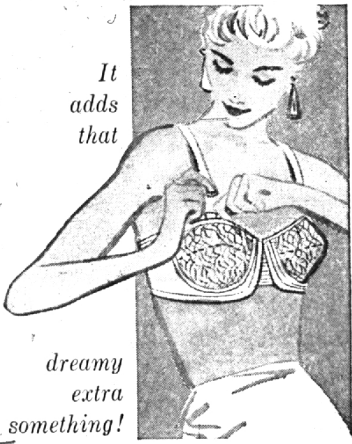


Area Women Attend Soroptimist Dinner
