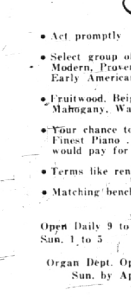

Postpone Reviews Of Ordinances On Buses, Pools

Proposed ordinances to regulate filter, buses and swimming pools were given only a glance Monday night, and discussion on the latter two postponed until next Monday night.

After three hours of discussion on fluoridation of water, widening of streets, municipal building alterations, sewage authorities (all reported elsewhere in this issue), the commission felt the late hour was not the time to start reviewing the fine print in the ordinance proposals.

However, they did give brief consideration to the litter ordinance, but took no action.

THIS WOULD be aimed primarily at doggers and handbills placed on auto windshields.

Residents at the corners of Adams and Maple this week wrote the city complaining of debris that passing motorists tossed onto their lawns.

The swimming pool ordinance, for which Commissioner Florence Willett has been fighting all winter, would require filtration, chlorination and fencing of all pools more than a foot deep.

The bus ordinance would control routes, routes and operating conditions of a Volkswagen-type shop's service that began operating Tuesday between the downtown business area and the northeast section of the city.

Commission Room Changes Outlined

First look at the architect's proposed revamping of the Birmingham city commission room was obtained Monday night.

Commissioners took no action, other than to say they would study it.

The suggestions, which are estimated at about \$30,000, would provide about 50 more audience seats, serve also as a courtroom, with additional court and conference facilities to be obtained from adjoining space formerly used by the fire department.

Commission did approve a \$1,550 reconstruction of the front door stair-walk approaches, which are to include handrails in the center of the wide steps.

Petitions Out For School Board Elections

With the May 12 deadline approaching, no petitions have been filed for the June 11 school board elections in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills school districts.

The terms of Mrs. E. M. Spence and William Spence are expiring in Birmingham and David W. Lee in Bloomfield Hills. All three incumbents are expected to file before the deadline.

A CHECK of the two school districts Wednesday morning revealed that petitions have been taken out for all three but not returned.

Mrs. Parnie and Spence seek four-year terms while Lee will be after his second two-year term in the Hills. Little opposition, if any, is expected in either election.

Planners Favor Widening S'ld

Widening of Southfield road to 32 feet from 14 Mile road to Lincoln avenue was recommended to the Birmingham city commission last week by the plan board.

Southfield widening would allow for one parking lane along the east side of the street and curbs and gutters on both sides.

Southfield from 14 Mile road to Lincoln is currently 20 feet wide. From Lincoln to Maple the road is 30 feet wide with one parking lane.

THE PLAN board also expressed approval of the proposed Oakland county expressway plan on Southfield from Eight Mile road that would pass west of Birmingham.

City Planner Herbert Herzberg told the board that such a highway would alleviate the heavy traffic on Woodward avenue.

In other action the board reviewed the rezoning request of William Herman's two unplatted lots on Woodward north of the Colonial terrace.

ABUTTING property owners were present for consideration of rezoning the parcels from Woodward back to the river for terrace development.

Definite action on the request is expected at the May plan board meeting when the owner and adjoining owners meet with the board.

Youth Committee Inducts Volunteers at YMCA Ceremony

Ten men were inducted into the leaders' fellowship in a ceremony participated in by all and read by Darstie, Fred and Doreen Hudson, and received fellowship cards giving them youth assignments in which they will be engaged.

Robert Kirkby and Charles Holley will serve as swimming instructors with the Birmingham YMCA swim group meeting each Saturday at the Pontiac YMCA.

Ben Harrison will act as leader of a boxing group and bait and fly casting club. Don Barlow and Joe Pearson will get as Gray club leaders.

New members of the youth committee are Edward Bennett, Gordon Love, Herbert Fleming and George Ely. Marion Gossett has also volunteered to help keep office machinery in good working order.

Pilot Uninjured In Plane Crash

A Peradelle flyer escaped injury early Saturday morning when he landed his light airplane on unlighted Berea Airport and used the runway and nosed up, almost hitting a parked plane.

The flyer, Raymond L. Corby, told Troy Police Chief David E. Gold Troy Police covered the field and he missed the runway in his two-passenger Covel plane.

The retractable landing gear snapped, propeller and spinning, and there was a hole in the windshield.

J. H. GROVES, 175 W. Frank Birmingham, witness to the crash, told Corby he saw the plane approach the field with landing lights on the plane, bounded on the runway and then the lights went out. Corby left before anyone arrived at the scene.

Coley Retires After 28 Years With Det. Edison

Glenn Coley 1179 Yorkshire, Birmingham, metallurgical engineer for Detroit Edison, retired recently after nearly 28 years of service with the company. A charter member of the Engineering Society of Detroit, Coley is well known for his many activities which have helped to promote engineering and the allied arts and sciences in the Detroit area.

Coley is native of Pittsfield, Illinois, and attended the University of Illinois where he received a chemical engineering degree in 1917. He served with the U. S. Air Force during World War I, and worked for United States Steel Corporation, Timken Axle Company, and the Tinsville Forge Company before joining Edison's sales department as a metallurgical engineer in 1928.

In 1951 he was given Detroit Edison's Alex Dow Award for his part in making a major improvement in power plant operations.

Since 1952 he has been metallurgical engineer for the company's planning and project engineering department where he has assisted many company departments in their metallurgical projects.

In addition to the Engineering Society of Detroit, he is also a member of the American Society for Metals, the Society of Automotive Engineers, the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers, American Foundrymen's Association, American Electrochemical Society and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Accept Troy's First Budget of \$405,350; Tax Rate Is \$14.11

TROY — City commissioners accepted Troy's first budget of \$405,350 and approved articles of incorporation of the North Evergreen sewer disposal authority by a special meeting Monday night.

The budget means a tax rate for Troy residents of \$14.11 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

The articles of the sewer authority have already been approved by three other authority members, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Bloomfield township, and is a step toward the Evergreen Interceptor sewers which would run through Southfield to Detroit, including in the larger authority, Southfield and Lathrup.

One of the proposed sewer systems that would look on to the smaller power plant operations proposed by Clair Construction Co. in the 17 Mile-Adams road area, was rejected by the commission because it did not meet authority requirements.

Take \$200 in Golf Clubhouse Breakin

BLOOMFIELD TWP. — Thieves broke into the Birmingham country club clubhouse and escaped with \$200 taken from a fling cabinet according to Oakland county sheriff's detectives.

John Brennan, club manager, told Det. Jack Darrin and Leo Hazen that, although a padlock had been put off a liquor cabinet, nothing besides the money was missing.

Birmingham Joins North Evergreen Sewer Authority

Formation of the North Evergreen sewage disposal authority will include Birmingham and three municipalities to cease River Rouge pollution, Birmingham City Manager Dr. C. Egbert told city commission Monday night.

He said this agreement was reached at a meeting last week between the state water resources and health departments and municipal representatives.

Birmingham commissioners then formally approved the authority's articles of incorporation, permitting Egbert to participate in contract negotiations with the authority.

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BESIDES Birmingham, the North Evergreen authority will include Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield township and Troy. All but Troy are under state citation to cease River Rouge pollution.

Egbert said the state advised going before the court to ask a permanent injunction. The project's construction plans, deadline now is July 1. Operation is scheduled to start by Jan. 1, 1958.

This authority is to be set up for three eventualities: abandonment with the joining of the overall Evergreen authority drain to the Michigan river, or permanent use of the Birmingham disposal plant if the larger Evergreen project is not carried out.

Later the Governor and his administrative board will attend a county-wide town hall meeting at Lincoln junior high school, Pontiac. Their topic will be a report to the people on state government.
