### Local Novelist Addresses Group Of Women Writers

"Goats, Writers, Goodwill: We Can Use Anything" was the title under which novelist Sylvia Cooper, Mrs. John Cooper of Pilgrim road, Birmingham, introduced her speech to the April meeting of Detroit Women Writers at the Women's City club, Detroit.

Mrs. Cooper, author of four novels, the last of which, "Thunderstone," was published by Simon and Schuster last spring and dramatized on Robert Montgomery playhouse last fall, told the Women Writers, "A novel is made by a human being and it detours her."

"IF YOU HAPPEN to write what people want to read when the novel happens to come out—money results. But the writer herself," Mrs. Cooper said, "will never know whether it's any good. She wants a clue from her friends as to what it is she has distilled, but she never really knows."

As to where a novelist gets the idea, "Where does a housewife get her idea of what to have for dinner?" Mrs. Cooper exclaimed. Pointing to her title she explained, "A novel is made up of ideas that are there all the time in memories, pictures, the dead dog in the road.
