Charts illustrated the growth of all departments of the church from its founding on March 1, 1953 up to the present day.
 Growth in church membership, approximately 600 members in three years, coupled with the 30 in March 1953 to over 400 at present, illustrated the need for additional professional leadership.

A world-traveler and member of the Christian Science board of lectureship, Dr. Archibald Carey, of Detroit, will speak on "Christian Science: How God Heals" at a free public lecture at First Church of Christ, Scientist, Tuesday at 8:15 p.m.
 Dr. Carey received the degrees of A.B. and LL.B. from the University of Michigan and LL.D. from Princeton college.
