Examine Handling Of Insured Package

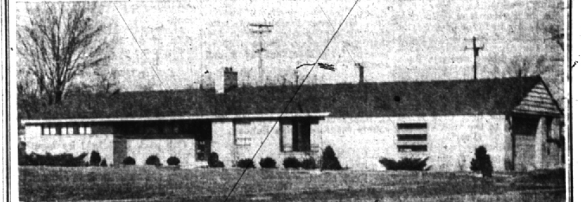

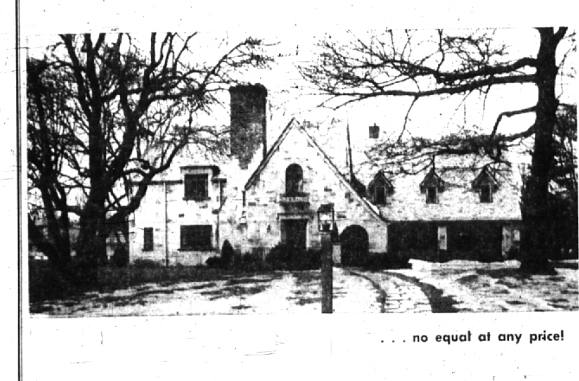
