Many Women's Groups Father to Preach To Wind Up Season At Rev. Taylor's Installation

Two special services Sunday will commemorate the one-year anniversary of Northminster Presbyterian church's formal organization. Rev. Mackay Taylor will be formally installed as minister, and the congregation's new church building will be dedicated.

At 10:30 a.m. Rev. Taylor will be officially installed as pastor of the church in a service at which his father will give the sermon. He is Dr. Wendell Taylor, father of Rev. Taylor and minister of Birkholm Presbyterian church in Mississippi, Miss.

Dr. Taylor is familiar to many Detroiters, as he was formerly pastor of Covenant Presbyterian church for 12 years.

Rev. Robert Graham, assistant minister at Birmingham's First Presbyterian church, will give the charge to the congregation, and Dr. Harold E. Fiedel, executive pastor of the Detroit Presbyterian board of church extension, will give the prayer to the minister.

At 4 p.m. service the \$55,000 first unit of Northminster church, located on the northeast outskirts of Birmingham, will be dedicated.

Dr. Kenneth G. Seth, executive secretary of the Presbyterian Synod of Michigan, will preach the sermon at the afternoon ceremonies. Dr. W. Glen Harris, minister of the First Presbyterian church of Birmingham, will also take part in the services.

Key to the church will be presented by Northminster's president of the first year, Mrs. D. James Wilson, and Church dignitaries from the Detroit area and Birmingham area will be in attendance. A reception will follow the dedication.

The presentation was made by Mrs. Harry Cook, of Riverwood, chairman of the Birmingham United Church Women's migrant committee.

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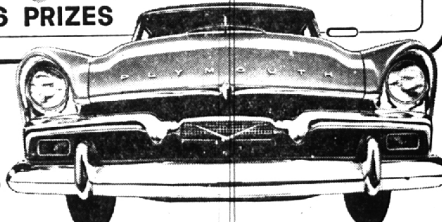
