## Big Cones Make Little Trees, Osage Garden Member's Hobby

A conglomeration of vegetable ribs, varieties of macaroni in the shapes of shells, ribbons or elbows, the foil of frozen foods, felt, gold braid, clay and some oversized pine cones—the results a gaily decorated holiday centerpiece.

Started a few years ago as an experiment by Mrs. W. T. LaRue, 2525 Kentmore, the art of decorating pine cones has become an interesting hobby.

Her first process is to spray cones from six to ten inches tall with green paint—it dries quickly and decorations can be added immediately.

MINIATURE ornaments consist of a variety of sizes and shapes of macaroni colored with vegetable dyes. To get other than the primary colors, she mixes the dyes. The tree is ready to be placed into a sturdy base, which also may be a "first" in the process if desired.

Mrs. LaRue uses the foil containers from frozen gravy, Billa with clay and covers with felt. A binding of gold braid accents the felt.

Glitter is added to daubs of glue and decorations are completed with a star topping the pine cone tree.

For variety Mrs. LaRue often sprays the trees all white and dyes stick macaroni red and uses as candles on the trees.

THESE decorative centerpieces will be seen, among other handicraft items, at the first fair of the Osage Branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden association—a fund-raising project for members only. The event will follow the Nov. 5 meeting at the home of Mrs. Hugh T. Carney, 5717 Sussex road, Birmingham.

Mrs. LaRue will not be around the day of the fair, she is leaving Friday to join her husband in San Francisco, then on to Palm Springs for a few days. Since obtaining pine cones is her most difficult problem, she intends to do a little "pine cone hunting" in California.
