Clark, Jr., and Mrs. Emil Dominick, representatives on the Home Demonstration council for the Royal Oak district, were present to assist in the organization of the club and to welcome them as new members.

LESSONS which the group will feature include Accessories for the Home, Quilts and Thrifty Meals, Saving Time and Energy, Family Vacations and Accessories and the Basic Dress. There will also be classes in making bedspreads and dressmaking.

 1. Rake (\$1.00 to \$3.95)  
 Sweep (\$33.50 to \$55.50 and up)  
 2. Burn:  
 In burners (\$2.65 to \$54.95)  
 In street (against the law)  
 3. Carry:  
 In burlap cloth (6' x 6')—\$3.50  
 In canvas cloth (7 1/2' x 7 1/2')—\$6.95  
 In canvas go-carts—\$15.45 to \$25.75  
 In wheelbarrows (inefficient)  
 4. To Compost Heap

Now that the witches have departed on their broomsticks, we can again suggest the bewitching beauty that comes from **SPRING FLOWERING BULBS**. On our shelves are the following items (not too many of each):  
 Tulips—83 varieties  
 Minor Bulbs—8 varieties  
 Lilies—3 varieties  
 Daffodils—only naturalizing  
 Miscellaneous—Dutch Iris, Lycoris Squamegira, Ranunculus, Anemone  
 (We done pretty good, eh?)  
 Perhaps a short run around the yard and garden might be helpful.

1. Concentrate on soil improvement. As you put BONE MEAL on perennial and annual beds, shrubs and small trees, add whatever PEAT MOSS AND SAND is necessary to give you a good soil texture.
2. Keep cutting the grass. Don't let it go dormant at over 1 1/2 inches.
3. Label plants if you want to know what is where in the Spring.
4. Don't leave leaves in garden corners where they may smother plants.
5. Burn the dead stalks of perennials to help control insect and disease problems.
6. DON'T use quick acting fertilizers now. Use BONE MEAL (and LIME where needed). Although the plant tops are dead and maybe gone the roots continue to grow and get ready for Spring.
7. DRAIN sprinkling systems, hose and sprinklers, oil the sprinklers, brink all (except the system) into warm storage.
8. Examine lilacs, fruit trees, poplars and ash for scale. If any leaf spray with SCALEKILDE when you can anticipate 8 hours above 40°.
9. If aphids appear on new shoots of chrysanthemums and other late bloomers, spray once with MALATHION.
10. Climbing roses exposed to the winds (pronounced WIND . . . like you wind a clock) should be tied up with rags or TWISTEMS to prevent bruising. (We don't sell rags.)
11. We've gone over our budget so we must stop. Anyway, next ad will be November 8th and there are a lot of things to be told in that month. Did we say TOLD? We meant SOLD!!!
