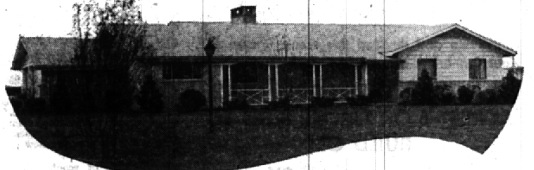
ority at the college. All that excitement on the Oriole bowling team last week was caused by Peggy Tate, a 119 average bowler rolling a 210 game.
