plumes, and it is one thing a lapidarian looks for in cutting the stone—a pattern... for color variation.

SPLITTING the stone is the first step toward the grinding and sanding out all scratches before going to the polisher... the polisher shines. Stones are held in the hands for the rough grinding and a dop stick is used for the finish shape.

In the case of precious stones intended for jewelry for adornment, the ancients at first had to satisfy themselves with rounding off the edges and irregularities of the crude stones and then polish their surface.

The method of faceting to bring about a greater brilliance from light reflection on the many faced surfaces requires a great amount of grinding and had been a much easier task for our skilled cutters, polishers and engravers.

There is so much greater production nowadays, but when we compare in quality and perfection of art in the marvelous intaglios and cameos done with great patience and paucity of tools, the ancients deserve a lot of credit.

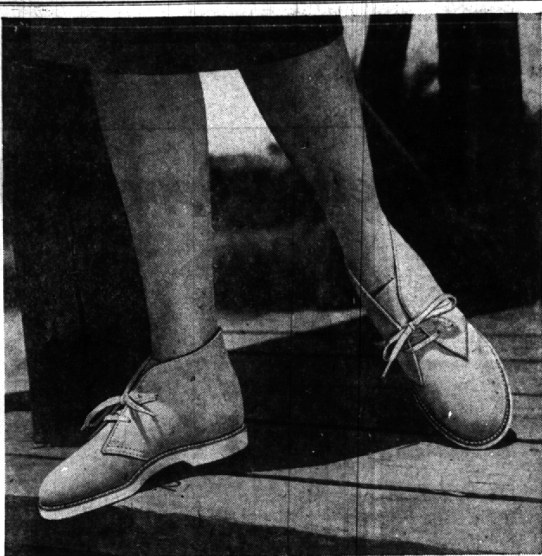

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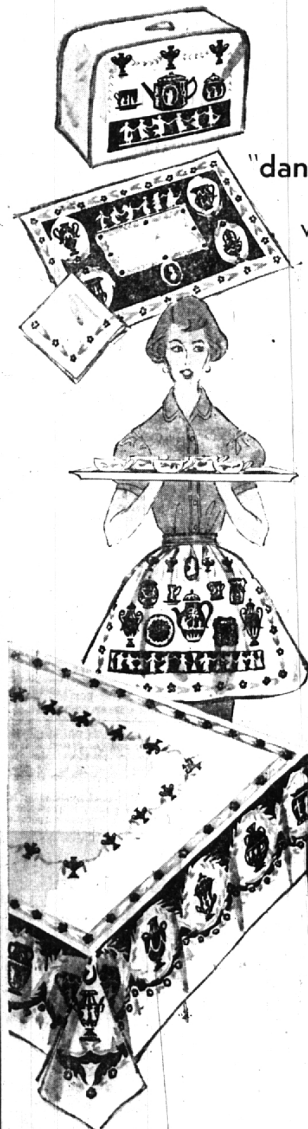
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
