Valley Woods Bldg. Permit May Get OK

The Birmingham school district's growing pains were acutely felt recently when they attempted to start work on the new Valley Woods elementary school off Lahser Road. With the contracts let and the builders on the site clearing ground, the plans were temporarily halted when the board was denied a building permit by Southfield Township.

What has prevented the issuing of the permit was the violation of the building ordinance, requiring water and sewage facilities at the site or under contract. The school system had several proposals to meet these requirements but none actually under way.

ON MONDAY, Dr. Richard Featherstone, who is handling negotiations for the Birmingham school district, received a tentative agreement for the building permit request by virtue of a letter of approval from the Oakland County Board of Health. This document

accepted the district's proposals for sanitation at Valley Woods. What the board had planned was two systems—a private high pressure sewage line connected to the 14 Mile Disposal Plant or preferably, a tie-in with North Evergreen Authority. The cost of the private line would be approximately \$38,000 where joining the Evergreen interceptor would be a great deal less.

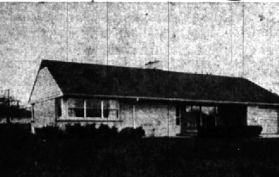
