Hockey League Officials Ready

The three leagues will consist of four teams each, 15 players per team. Tom Oasberger has been selected for the 15 to 18 group; Three more coaches are needed for the league.

The selection of teams will be conducted by the coaches in a skating session at the Eton Park Rink in about two to three weeks. Girardin, stated that he would like to start league play about the 15th of December and that the boys would be notified through the schools and newspapers.

Her main idea is to make this winter recreation a family affair. Miss Heard believes skating levels can be developed which will allow all members of a family to find an evening of enjoyment together. Some of the programs she is making preparations for are: skate dancing, group skating, instruction, games, contests and a hockey play. All free skating periods will be planned with a definite event. Calls will be broadcast over the public address system announcing the type of skating for the period. Dancing covers all kinds: waltzes, congas, foxtrots, singles, couples, and trios.

"OF COURSE," she emphasized, "our main concern is the safety of the skaters. We will supervise the skating at all times." Racers, the long-bladed skates, will not be permitted this year during the open skating period. Miss Heard feels they are quite dangerous.

"We will have specified times set aside for speed skating and plan to hold contests and races in this event."

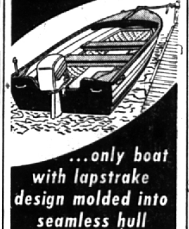
The Charles H. Howson award will remain in the Cranbrook showcase until next they meet.

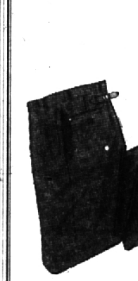

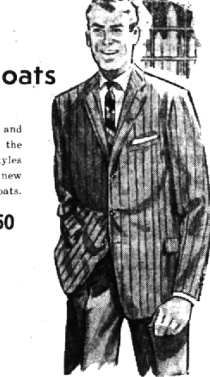
