Following the recent christening of their young son, Ronald Albert, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Zern entertained 15 family members at a party at their home on 14 Mile road.

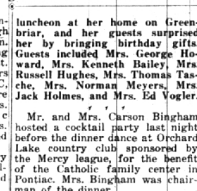
