It was back to the kitchen for members of Alpha last week. They had another bake sale after school Friday, directed by the chapter's president, Nancy Smith.

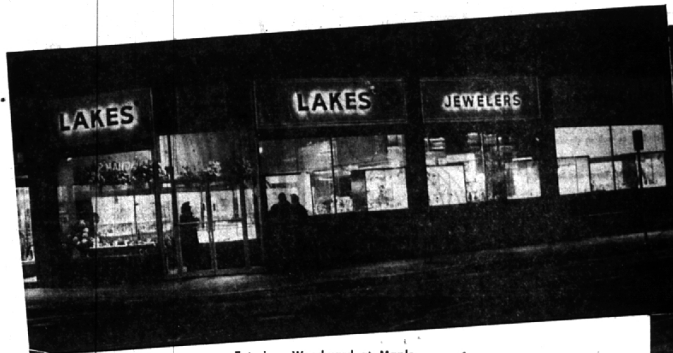

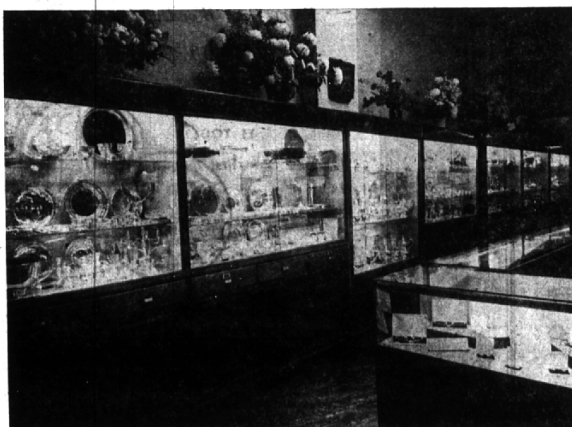

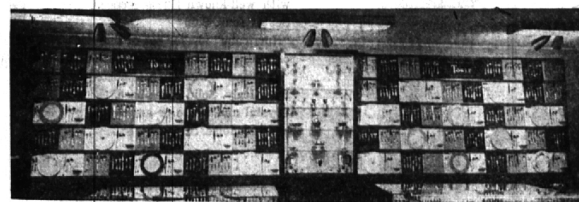
Exterior—Woodward at Maple
