Bietel, secretary and Ellen Tucker, treasurer.

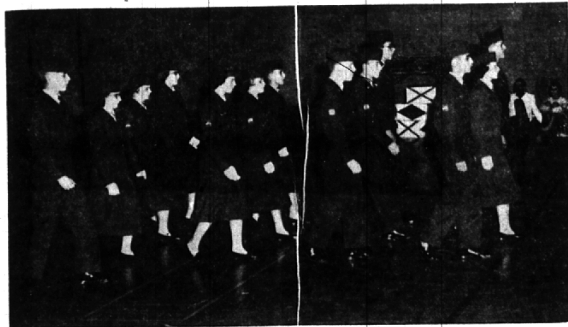

BHS Turns Out 12,000 Copies Of 'Observer'

Over 12,000 copies of "The Observer", American Education week paper, were turned out by the journalism classes and print shop of Birmingham high school in a record-breaking job.

A copy of the paper went home with every pupil and teacher in the city's school system.

A committee of teachers wrote the paper. Members were appointed by Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, and headed by Charles Palmer, principal of Pembroke school. 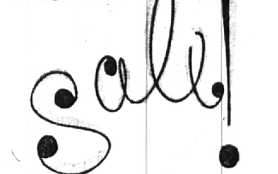
COPY WAS EDITED by Miss Vida B. McGiffin, high school journalism teacher. Pasteup was done by Judy von Rosen, Mike Conroy, and Jeff Ott; and headlines and titles were set on the Headliner by Andy Hawley and Sue Booker, all of the high school publications departments.

Joseph Duris, printing instructor, was in charge of platemaking and press work. The paper required a press run of nearly 50,000 to get the 12,000 copies needed.

The assembling, stapling, and folding jobs were handled by the high school journalism classes and print shop.

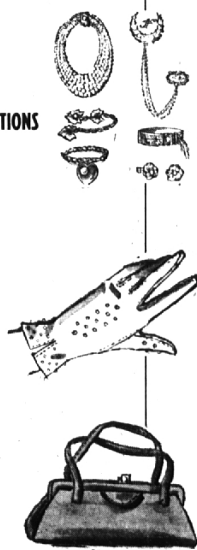
