With the square dance season many hostesses plan to entertain their square dance club in their own recreation room. If you don't belong to such a club, however, but find the need to introduce houseguests to a large number of your friends, an old-fashioned hoe-down is a wonderful answer.

Likewise, in this day of rock and roll, vast numbers of our teenagers and even sub-teens love to square dance and are being taught the dances in the public schools. If son or daughter has a birthday coming up or just plain wants to give a large party, why not a square dance?

If it is your square dance club, perhaps, during the nice fall weather they would like to pool funds and have a hay-ride first and then wind up the evening with a lively square dance, making a truly old-fashioned country party.

If you want to make your child's party a bit more elaborate, they, too, would love a pre-dance hay-ride.

A PARTY of this kind should not include dinner as it not only makes too much work for the hostess but introduces too much into one party, making it too long and drawn out.

Besides, people do not want to square dance on a full stomach, so limit refreshments to nibble material available throughout the evening.

Slice physical activity causes thirst, how about a large plate or tray of pop-corn balls and cookies and coffee on tap for the entire evening? Likewise, a large tray of doughnuts and plenty of cider and coffee would be tempting.

IF YOUR PARTY is for a group who would not go for square dancing, how about a hay-ride and taffy pull? No need to shrink at the thought of pulling taffy which so often fails to be of right consistency at the crucial moment. Here is a recipe, tried and true that makes sticky pieces.

Molasses taffy: 2 cups light molasses, 2 teaspoons vinegar, 1 1/2

tablespoons butter, a little salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda.

COOK MOLASSES and vinegar together slowly, stirring constantly until a little dropped in cold water turns brittle. Be sure to use a large pan for cooking as this mixture boils over readily and foams up when soda is added.

Take syrup off stove, add butter, salt and soda. Stir until it stops foaming, then pour onto buttered flat pan.

When cool enough to handle, pull corners to center and press down, making compact mass, allowing you to break off chunks to hand to guests.

For pulling, hands should be buttered. Pull until it gets light in color and starts to harden. Then quickly pull into strips about 1/8 inch in diameter and cut strip into pieces. Eat—have fun!

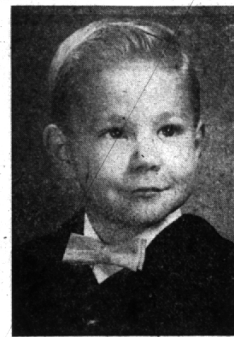
