"WE'RE ANXIOUS to seek out new vocalists and new instrumentalists who are seriously considering music as a career," Lieberman stated. In fact, one of our prime purposes in conducting this contest is to turn up new men and women who are musically talented, and who would be willing to and capable of performing as soloists with the symphony orchestra."

The contest is open to all persons who are residents of South Oakland county, or who are pupils of music teachers in the area. No limits are set as to age. Instrumental applicants must perform on an instrument which can be accompanied by the orchestra. Winners in each class will be given the opportunity of performing publicly at the January 27th family concert sponsored by the Society. Plans are also being made by the Society to sponsor winners in a joint recital at school assemblies in the South Oakland County area.
