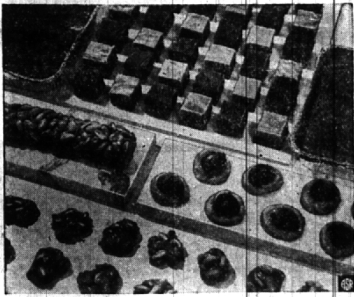


## Two-Tone Fudge—Holiday Treat



Pure heaven for the youngsters is this unusual Two-Tone Fudge—creamy rich chocolate, teamed with the pleasant saltiness of peanut butter. It's all from one simple basic recipe combination of evaporated milk, caramels and sugar. To one-half add peanut butter, and to the other half, add semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Make this wholesome candy in squares, swirls dropped from a spoon on waxed paper or foil, peanut clusters, or rolls made by shaping cooled fudge into logs and rolling them in salted peanuts.

### TWO-TONE FUDGE

1 cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
2 cups sugar 1/2 cup peanut butter

1/2 pound (14) caramels  
Combine evaporated milk and sugar in 2-quart saucepan. Add caramels. Place over low heat and cook, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved and mixture comes to a boil. Increase heat and boil 4 minutes, stirring constantly. To 1 1/2 cups of the mixture add the semi-sweet chocolate morsels and stir until smooth; turn into greased 7 or 8-inch square pan. To remaining mixture add peanut butter and stir until smooth; turn into pan over chocolate mixture. Chill until firm; cut into squares.

YIELD: Approximately 2 pounds.  
\*Use remaining chocolate morsels to decorate fudge.

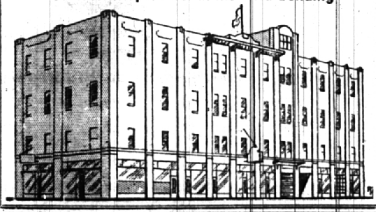
