Sewage Discussions Take Entire Twp. Bd. Meeting

SOUTHFIELD—Time ran out on township trustees who took up only two main items on the agenda Tuesday night and had to call a special meeting for Saturday at 2:30 to consider the rest of the lengthy slate of business.

In opposition to the township's proposed "Iron Pipe" Ordinance, which would require methods of controlling storm and sewage flow including use of sump pumps, Builders Association of Metropolitan Detroit executive secretary Irving Yackness presented sanitary and plumbing authorities who told township trustees the ordinance would serve no useful purpose and was not the answer to flooding conditions in Southfield.

AS A RESULT of the testimony, Trustee Luther Wagner moved to table the ordinance for further study before taking action. Supervisor Eugene Swen cast the only "no" vote.

Those who spoke to the board were: Glenn Shields, chief of department of plumbing in Detroit; Professor Earnest Boyce who teaches sanitary engineering at U of M; Arthur W. Gillespie, local engineer; Ralph A. Main, civil engineer and Oakland county drain commissioner; and A. Jerome Giesler, president of Michigan Association of Plumbing Contractors.

Main told the board they were on the right track with the ordinance in some respects, but that they ought to require separate systems for sanitary and storm flow, or an adequate sewer system.

HE AND THE others did not think it would be needed with separate sewer systems. Main recommended that the township charge fees so that a fulltime inspector could be hired to check newly installed sewer systems.

Boyer told the board to "devote your time to keeping the storm water out of the sanitary sewers."

"We're going to keep the sanitary sewage out of the basement if we have to fill the basement up," said Swen. "If there's adequate gravity flow, we don't need the sump pump," he stated, adding that Southfield has no adequate double systems.

The other problem taken up by the board and which will be taken up again Saturday is the amount to be charged for sewage disposal in Cranbrook Village, a Rodney Lockwood development.

SWEN SAID cost of disposing of sludge from Lockwood's treatment plant by trucking it to South Oakland County Authority sewers, would be \$600 monthly, or roughly \$1,800 per month per month.

Lockwood argued that he placed \$2,000 in escrow which he believed should cover extra costs. The developer's proposal to the board was that the township run the plant at a "reasonable" cost until the \$3,000 was used up.

By that time, said Lockwood, more families would be in the development and the cost per family would be reduced.

"WHY CHARGE \$3 per month for one month, and then jump the price to \$15 the next month?" asked Swen, who contended that it would take \$1,700 for the township to take over the plant, plus \$600 to bring the plant up to standard; leaving only \$700 to cover any mechanical deficiencies.

Councilman Hugh G. Allerton Jr. asked that the board table discussion on the question, and let Swen appoint a committee who would try to reach a reasonable settlement with Lockwood, Cranbrook Village residents and the township.
