Walker Lee Cislser, AAUW Speaker To Discuss 'Aspects of Atomic Energy'

Walker Lee Cislser, president and director of the Detroit Edison company, will be guest speaker at the monthly luncheon meeting of the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women. He will discuss "The International Aspects of Atomic Energy" at 12:45 p.m., Nov. 14, at the Community House.

To be introduced by Ruth Shain, herself a recent European traveler and conductor of the International Affairs class, Mr. Cislser, a recent returnee from a global trip and a former executive secretary of the Atomic Energy Commission Advisory group will bring timely and expert knowledge of this controversial subject to the group.

MR. CISLSER has spent his entire business career in the electric power industry. Graduating from Cornell university in 1922 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering, he immediately became associated with the Public Service Electric and Gas Co.

Having attained the position of assistant general manager of the Detroit Department by 1943, he resigned to become chief engineer of power plants for the Detroit Edison company.

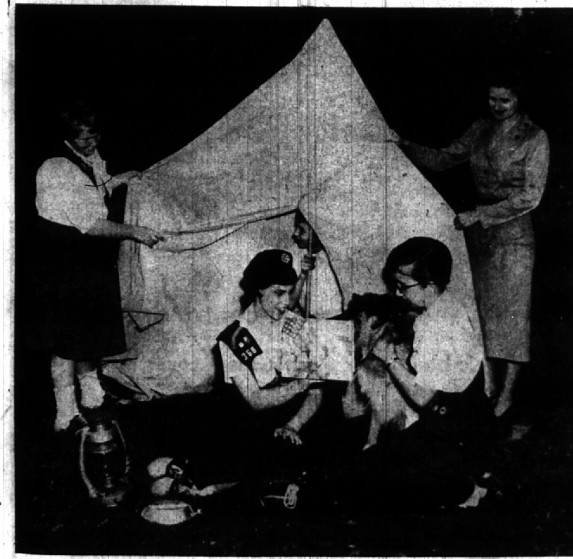
In January 1948, he was elected executive vice president of that company and in September 1951, director. The honor and duties of the Presidency were handed him December 1951 and on July 1, 1954, the duties of the chairman of the board were incorporated.

recently Harold E. Stassen appointed Mr. Cislser to a Special Task Group studying disarmament. Moreover, the position as advisor on the United States Delegation to the International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy in Geneva is Mr. Cislser's. Mr. Cislser has continuously been concerned with affairs of broad interest to industry and government. In recognition of this, six European governments and the United States have decorated him. He is a Fellow of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, The American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and the American Institute of Management, and a recipient of the George Westinghouse Gold Medal Award in 1954 from ASME and the Henry Lawrence Gantt Joint award by them and American Management association.

QUOTING Allen B. Crow, president of the Economic club of Detroit, "Colonel Cislser, through the multiple of his constructive business and civic undertakings, is the embodiment of the electrical and nuclear energy of which he is one of the foremost authorities and developers in the United States and around the world.
