

Works by Local Artists Selected For Michigan Artists Exhibition

The 47th annual Michigan Artists Exhibition opening Tuesday evening, at Detroit Institute of Arts will include works of art by many artists from the Birmingham area.

Water colors have been entered by Evelyn Dew Altman, 3317 Greenlee road, and Frederick Simmer, 3075 Siding road. Among photos accepted were those by Kathleen Lorrive, Hilltop Lane, Greengarden, 1528 N. Woodward, and Harvey Crose and Jerry J. Rudiquist of Craibrook.

THE ENTRY of Judith Ann Reese, 1847 Villa, was a silk screen, and Manassa C. Pressnell, 723 Colonial Ct., submitted a wood-kokabook titled "Mother and Child." Mary Jeanne Connolly of Cranbrook did an ink drawing for the show, and the effort of Marie C. Obermeyer, 884 Kenesaw is an alabaster "Owl."

A mixed oil easel was accepted from John B. Tabb, 1696 Bowers, and an oil and gouache from Zoltan Sepesly of Academy road. A welded steel creation and an oil by Whitney Savin of Cranbrook were chosen for the exhibition as were two bronze works by Berthold Schiwetz, Jr., of Cranbrook.

ALSO to hang at the exhibition, which will continue through Dec. 21, are paintings by Roger Crispehl, 4550 Kirkcaldy, Robert A. Herzberg, 1936 Holland, Mildred S. Williams, 565 Baldwin Ct., Jan DiMarco, 400 Dunstan, Jane McIntyre, 995 Timberlake drive, Ruby H. Williams, Havelhill road, and Ben M. Fortuna of Charles lane, Franklin.

Most of the works will be for sale at studio prices, no commission being taken by the artist. Institute secretary, who is in charge of the exhibition, said that this year's show contains less abstract work than has been included in recent years.


"Commissions for Michigan Artists," the special section instituted as part of the annual exhibit four years ago, this year deals with the sculpture program for Eastland shopping center. Among sculptors included is Marshall Fredericks of Washington road, Bloomfield township. Models, works in progress, and several finished pieces will be shown, along with plans and descriptive material integrating the works with the architecture of the center.
