Behind it all, we discovered, was the Rev. Barton Lloyd, in costume as he accompanied his three youngsters, on "trick or treat" night.

Mr. Lloyd, who is associated with Christ Church Cranbrook on a mission to establish a new Episcopal church in the southwest Birmingham school district area, tells us the new parish is looking for a place to meet Sundays.

So far, a nucleus of about 20 interested people, he reports, have met. At the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry P. Bemis, of 1899 Crosswick, in Valley Woods, and later at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Arnold Newcomb, 19834 Riverside, in West Beverly, the new group has met to set up a preliminary organization and make tentative plans for children.

But most important of all, the group is seeking a meeting place somewhere in the new mission area, which runs from West Beverly to Franklin and includes all of the Birmingham school district in that area.

The Birmingham board of education has refused their request to hold meetings in a school, and so far the group has been unable to uncover any other centrally located meeting spot. Anybody got any ideas?

Work is expected to begin in February on the addition to Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, according to the Rev. Theodore Waggner. Meanwhile, Mr. Waggner reports, the church is continuing with three services—9, 9:45 and 11 a.m.—to accommodate the church's fast-growing membership.
