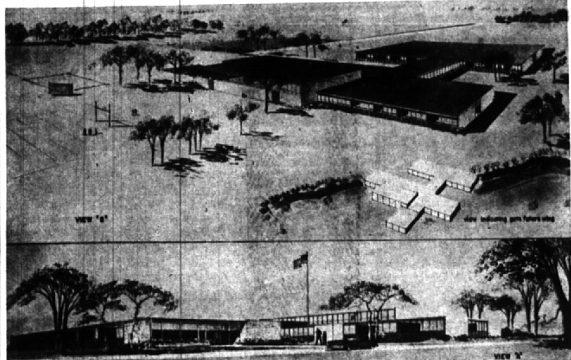
St. Bede's Guilds Offer Handmade Gifts at Fall Fair

Wants Dutch Lack Candidates for Elm Program 'field City Election

LATHRUP—Councilman Frederick O. Johnson called upon the city council to ask the city's true committee to prepare by January 15 a course of action to fight Dutch elm disease in line with the city's ability and desire to carry out such a program.

BOTH Campbell and Feysereen stated Monday that they favored training, fertilizing and watering trees some other type of preventive program short of spraying what Campbell termed "poisonous liquids" on the community.

"JUST because you don't approve of DDT you're holding up the whole program," said Mrs. Vincent A. Marshall, 18595 St. Joseph.

"I'm trying to keep the city from needlessly spending money," answered Campbell, who stated that the spraying would not give a guarantee that spraying would eliminate Dutch elm disease entirely.

"WHEN you have an epidemic in the community, all the people don't die," said Campbell, meaning that some trees would be immune to the disease whether sprayed or not.

Johnson pointed out that neighboring communities have had marked decline in tree losses to the disease by spraying.

Quick First-Aid may make Life-and-Death Difference
If you have not yet had first-aid training, here are a few important ways to help the injured. The person may still need attention from a trained first-aid officer.

SEVERE shock should be treated by placing a cloth pad directly on the wound itself. Towels, sheets, or any clean material can be used for emergency pads. Bind the cloth in place, if the bleeding doesn't stop, use more pads and more pressure. The important thing is to stop the bleeding, and then pressure on a wound will often do it.
