Consider Tighter Zoning in Sec. 24

SOUTHFIELD—Zoning board members are recommending that township board of the northeast quarter and part of the northwest quarter of Section 24 be zoned from Residential Two (R-2) to R-3.

Included in that area are Meadows Downs and Meadow Sub. #1.

Meadows Downs Civic association, headed by James W. Fuller, 16060 Fuller, filed the petition requesting the upgrading in zoning.

Board Chairman E. F. Wuerfel told those at the meeting last Thursday that the switch in zoning was to protect the value of homes already constructed in the area. Many of these were R-3 and even R-4, much higher than the minimum R-2 classification allowed in the area.

Some of the property owners, who had planned smaller homes in the area, stood opposed to the rezoning.

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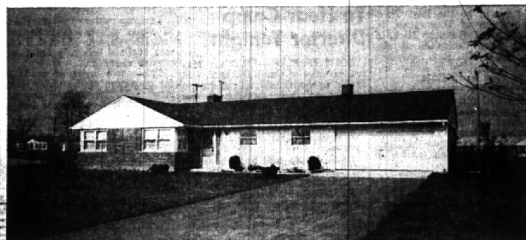
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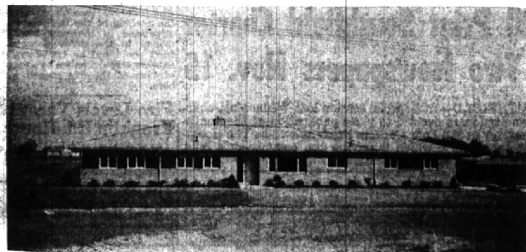
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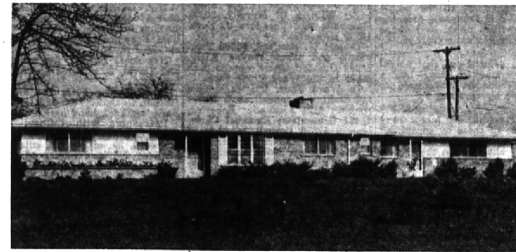
