After a wedding trip to Florida and Cuba the couple will reside at 529 East Grand boulevard.

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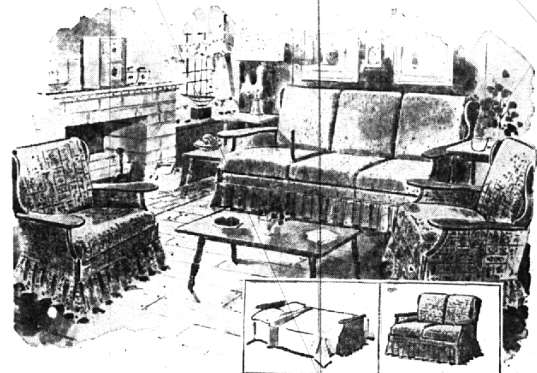
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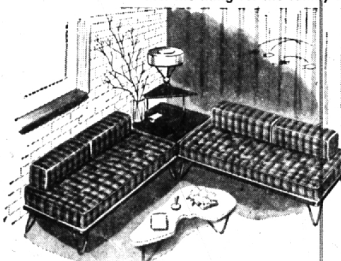


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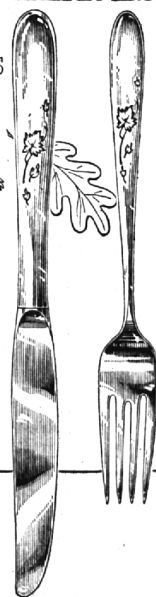
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
