ers, water, and roads, and that the government has no more authority in meeting these problems.

WILBUR R. Thompson, 20521 Woodburn, asked if the six wards were set up according to population. Thompson feared that eventually the highly-populated areas would be broken up. He wanted the council and wanted some automatic means of shifting the wards every five or ten years. Russell H. Cullen, charter secretary, said the wards were fairly even in population totals and that there would not be much unevenness when the area was developed. People could change the charter if representation became too uneven, Cullen added.

RAY R. WOODS, 18486 W. 11th, filed and protested the five-mill limitation, stating that Southfield taxpayers association wanted a three-mill limit. Woods is president of the association.

Announcing that the group's board of directors had held a meeting recently and voted the three-mill limit, Woods said, "We will compromise at a three-mill limit. Originally we wanted to have the limit at six mills. But the taxpayers association would not agree to a lower tax limit could be the difference in passing the charter."

He said his group was "oared" throughout Southfield but did not have enough support of membership with him.

CHARTER Commissioner Will J. Oliver said the five-mill tax limit was about one-half mill above the present township rate after township taxes are equalized.

"Unless you get a lot of citizens out working night after night for free you're going to have to pay more than five mills," said Howard Coleman, president of Southfield Citizens' League.

Asked if the school districts would be disturbed by incorporation Oliver answered, "No."

T. Neil McGregor, 25082 Lardine, asked if incorporation would allow any weight to the fight against the proposed Southfield expressway.

COMMISSIONER Marvin R. Birch said the State Highway Department would deal with cities "on a higher level" than with township matters.

He said the township would be a "better" than the last charter because we have attempted to get the pulse of the people and put in it what they, the people want.

ALL officials are elected, said Elmer E. Buss, and "it does not place power in the hands of an appointed city manager but in the hands of the elected officials."

The charter is patterned after the State and Federal government's division of three branches—legislative, executive and judicial, concluded Elmer.
