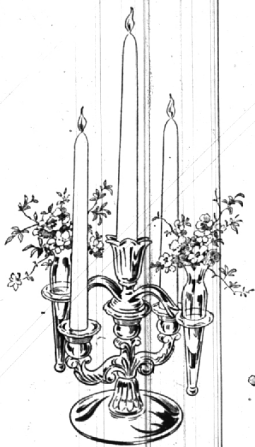

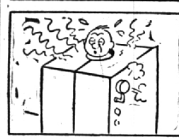
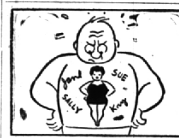
Honorary tickets went to Tom da Fonseca, Helly Heldenstein, and Klaus Parsch, exchange students.

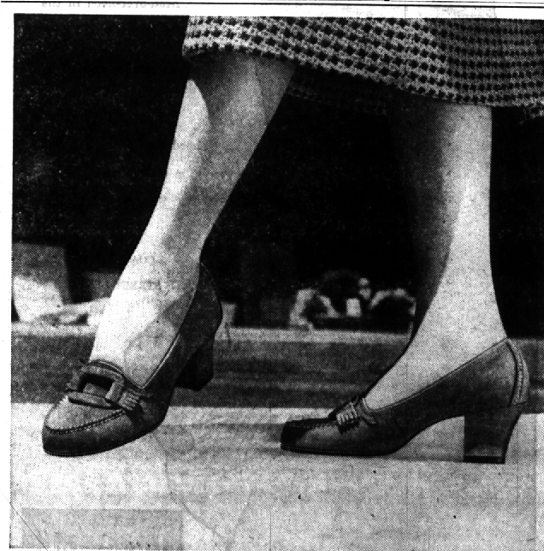
