At a recent meeting, the board of trustees voted money be spent for: new reference materials \$167.50; new book cart, \$87.50; records for the new gift record player, \$200.00.

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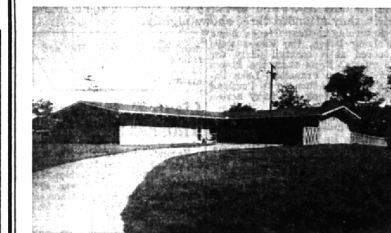
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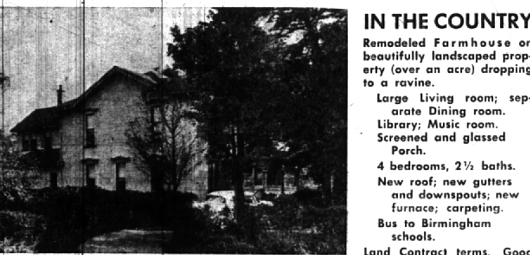
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
