Mrs. Bauer, assisted by senior class advisor Miss Josephine Waldo, presented the rings.

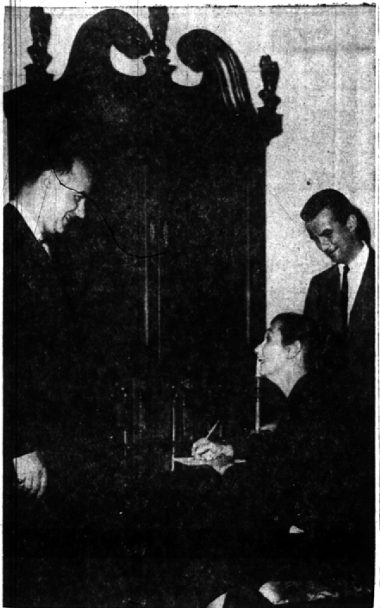
## Pep Club Dance Honors Athletes

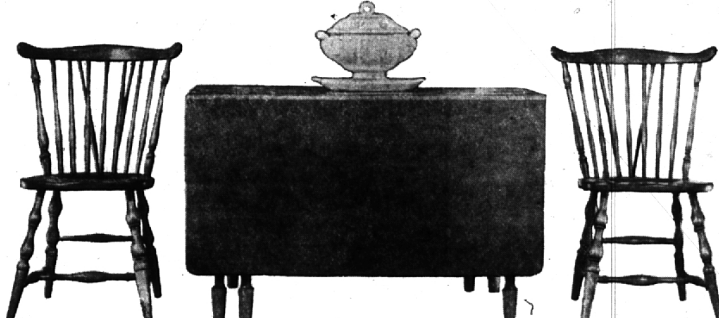
