This party is for adults. If it is your turn to entertain a fairly large group of mixed couples, try it. Or, if you are on the committee for a social evening at your church club, it will be perfect.

In any case, this must be used with groups of 20 or more. The larger the group, the funnier it is and the more possibilities there are for its success.

Our party is an "Auction Party."

WHO DOESN'T love an auction? And certainly your guests would like this one as it is all done with out any real money. Bidders bid their worldly goods and even these can be imaginary.

A bidder may yell out, "I bid my mother-in-law" or "I bid Marilyn Monroe" or "I bid the Chick Sales on my grandfather's farm."

The real secret of this auction's success is to have a clever auctioneer who can recognize the cleverest bid for the nature of the item being sold, and sell immediately when he hears a bid that he thinks will bring the house down with laughter.

THE HOST and hostess or the committee in charge of this party should find about six or eight items to sell that will really appeal to the audience and bring out the bids. For instance, the latest Equine calendar, a bottle of "water from the fountain of youth," guaranteed, any number of good-luck charms, an Elvis Presley platter, sodas for two at the popular soda-bar of your vicinity (you have paid for these in advance, of course) and any items of your choice.

A QUICK WAY to get this auction under way is to have two or three previously informed bidders planted in the audience. When the auctioneer announces the first item for sale, have them yell out some bids and the rest of the group will then be quick to follow suit. This saves a lot of lengthy, tiring explaining.

If the items to be sold are cleverly selected and the first bids are funny enough, this party is a real riot.

ONCE used this party for an assembly of about 500 soldiers during the war in an overseas hospital. The auctioneer started off by putting up for sale, a pair of ladies pink, ruffy panties. Of course the bids were fast and wild but suddenly he heard, from the back of the tent, "I bid Eleanor." Immediately he sold to this bidder and it brought the house down in gales of laughter.

Another item that evening was a bottle of coke (the rarest of treats over there). A soldier yelled out that he bid his last night's dream. The auctioneer yelled "Sold." The screams and whistles were deafening.

TRY THIS sometime but make sure your items for sale are really well thought out as appropriate for your particular type of group as herein lies the success of the party. And make sure you have a very lively, clever auctioneer with a quick sense of humor.
