

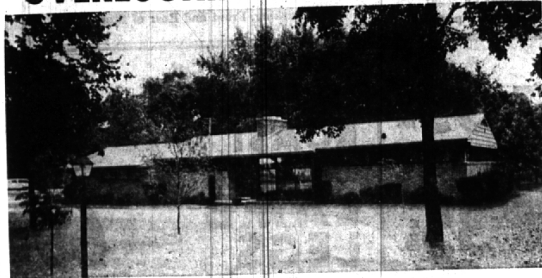
Pontiac Golfers Win at Brooklands

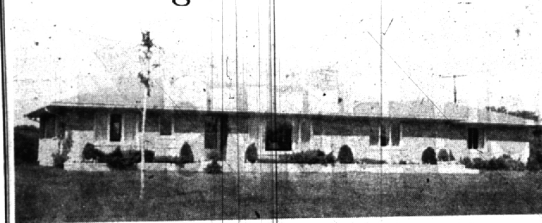
