Legislative Courage Might Have Saved Bruce's Right Leg

Because Michigan's legislators and administra-ve officials don't know how to go about "educat-

Ten-year-old Bruce Wright of Bloomfield Hills will have to wear an artificial right leg for the remainder of his life.

Because Michigan's legislature and its admin-strative officials hadn't yet considered amending

Five-year-old Nancy Waggoner of Bloomfield township was killed six years ago.

Because Michigan's legislators and administra-tive officials still are trying to figure out how the public can be "educated"—

Names of an undetermined number of other boys or girls in Michigan may be added to the too-long list of those children who have been killed or maimed for life as they get on or off a school bus on a country road.

On the first day of school, Bruce waited till the school bus had passed, then started across the road toward home. Driver of a car approaching the bus from the opposite direction didn't see Bruce in time. Bruce lost his right leg a day later in the hospital. . . .

SIX YEARS AGO, Nancy, too, started across the road be-hind the bus. She was killed right before the eyes of her mother.

Why did these terrible situations happen? What can be done to prevent them in the future?

The Birmingham Eccentric made some telephone calls this eek, and learned these facts:

• Michigan law does not regulate the drivers of automobiles who pass in the opposite direction the thousands of properly marked and poorly marked school buses which travel our state's highways and roads each day of the school

42 OTHER STATES do regulate vehicles approaching City Advises school buses from the opposite direction.

That could happen even with a "perfect" educational program.

YET SUCH POSSIBILITIES should be weighed carefully against those accidents which will occur—us they have in the past—because we have no regulation.

If this "driver education" MUST precede adoption of such an amendment, surely there is SOMEONE in this state who can come forward with an acceptable idea.

We'll start off with one ourselves:

The state highway department has speed limit signs posted every five or six miles throughout the state. It also has state every five or six miles throughout the state. It also has state and federal route markers not more than a mile apart.

PERHAPS EITHER OR BOTH of these sign standards could temporarily or permanently be used for an explanatory a sign reading something like this: "All Traffic Must Stop Both Directions When School Bus Warning Lights Flash— state law".

Other features the legislature also may like to consider for better safety in school bus operation:

Require all buses—whether school owned or leased—to be PLAINLY marked both front and rear.

School buses to remain stationary until all children have ossed the highway.

All children to cross highway IN FRONT OF THE BUS and under the watchful eye of the driver.

INCIDENTALLY, YOU MIGHT be interested to learn that even the present law DOES NOT PROHIBIT motorists from going around school buses from the rear.

The law only requires the overtaking driver to stop at least 10 feet to the rear of the stopped bus "... and then proceed with caution."

The legislature in its next regular session starting in January should act to save the legs and lives of our future Nancys and Bruces!
