### Dr. R. H. Baker Dies at Age 64

DR. ROBERT H. BAKER, 64, 1129 Fairfax, died Thursday night at Pontiac General hospital, where he had served as chief of staff in 1906. He was a member of the hospital's executive committee for many years and an officer of its building, surgical qualifications and other committees.

Born April 10, 1892, in Bay City, he received his medical degree from the University of Michigan in 1916. He became an instructor in surgery at the university after serving in the Army in World War I.

In 1920, Dr. Baker opened his office in Pontiac. He served the Michigan State Medical society in various capacities, including those of delegate, vice speaker, speaker of its house of delegates and member of the council and executive committee. In 1954-55, he was president of the society, an office held many years earlier by his father, Dr. Charles H. Baker, the only instance of a father and son holding this office.

He also had been secretary, treasurer and president of the Oakland County Medical society. Active in formulating hospital-medical insurance plans, Dr. Baker served as secretary of the Michigan Medical Service.

He was a charter member of the Pontiac Kiwanis club and the Torch club and was elected a life fellow of the American Congress of Surgeons.

Although he was discovered to have cancer five years ago, he continued his practice until this summer.

He is survived by his wife, Helen, a son, Donald, of Bay City, a daughter, Mrs. Gail Wells of Kalamazoo, and a sister, Mrs. May Baker Marsh, of St. Petersburg, Fla.

Funeral services were Saturday from All Saints Episcopal church, Pontiac.

THOMAS J. MARTIN, 61, of 2871 12 Mile road, Southfield township, died Monday. Funeral service was held this morning from the Hooley Funeral Home, Farmington, followed by a high mass at St. Michael's church. Burial was in National Memorial cemetery, Redford township.
