Soviet Building Standards 'Poor'

New Russian apartment buildings have a drab sameness and construction workmanship is "terribly, terribly weak," according to Royal Oak builder Ted Pratt.
He was one of 14 U. S. builders who travelled 7,000 miles in Russia this summer to observe Soviet building methods.
"They are doing a tremendous job of rebuilding their war-torn cities," he said in a talk Monday night to the Birmingham Rotary club.

RUSSIANS ARE going to great lengths with their city planning, including streets 200-300 feet wide, many parks, but practically no parking areas.
"If they ever put on the highways as many cars as we have in America, they'll be in real trouble," said Pratt, who is a director of both the Detroit and National building associations.
He said most construction involves prefabricated concrete blocks, concrete panels, or brick panels.
"There is a functional Soviet building plan, which includes only 100 square feet of living space for each person (equal to a room 16 by 10 feet)," he said.
He said he saw practically no single residential building.
