To start off the evening, give each couple a complete newspaper. Tell the group that each couple will have 30 seconds to find each of the following items in their honey-moon at Niagara Falls, paper and clip them: a corn of bunion ad, a farm for sale, a wallet lost, a wallet found, a good home for a Persian cat, an ad for snuff, story of a hit-run case, a sports injury story, engagement announcement, wedded couple to honeymoon at Niagara Falls, beauty hint, a recipe, meeting of a women's church circle, horse for sale, speeding arrest.

THE HOST or hostess times with a stopwatch and everyone must stop searching their papers when "stop" is called on each item. The couple with the most correct items at the finish is the winner.

For the next game, why not mix up the couples because the women are going to costume the men in newspaper attire.

Provide each lady with a pair of scissors, a box of common pins, possibly Scotch tape and paste and place all the newspapers that the group used for the last contest in the middle of the floor for the use of all.

At THE SIGNAL to start, each lady cuts, pastes, pins and frantically designs and makes a costume for her partner, fitting it to him as she goes. If you have provided crayons, the men will be able to color parts of it to make it more effective when completed.

Allow about 10 minutes for them to finish their creations—then call time and have the men model their garments. By applause of the group, determine the winning partners.

FOR THE final game, have the group put out a newspaper on the spot. Seat them at tables where you have put plenty of writing paper and pencils.

Assign them to certain sections of the paper—such as sports, fashions, travel local news, society, world affairs, classified, editorials, advice to the lovelorn, TV and radio, etc. Allow them about half an hour to get this newspaper together.

When time is up, assemble the production and read it aloud to the group while they are enjoying their cold-cut sandwiches and coffee.

There's lots of fun and a million laughs in this party and it is simple to prepare and inexpensive to give.
