Approve Lean-To On Ten Mile Road To Shelter Flowers

SOUTHFIELD—A request for approval of a 12- by 15-foot lean-to on an old building located on the Bertha Wolf farm, on the north side of 10 Mile, one-quarter mile west of Telegraph, was approved by the zoning board of appeal last week.

Morris D. Hamm, 2340 W. 10th Mile road, who sells flowers on weekends at the location, wants the lean-to to protect the flowers from the elements.

The board granted use of the building for two years, provided that the exterior is finished with plywood and painted. James Hickey, township land planner, said that under another owner, the present structure might be enlarged again and again until it is large enough for a store.

The flower shop has been in existence for 25 to 30 years. Area residents have complained about the addition, according to Building Inspector Frank Gidley, who added that it is a violation of the building code to add on to a non-conforming use.

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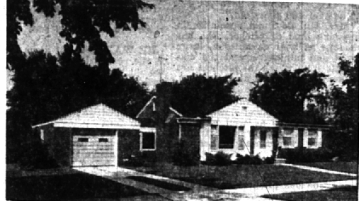

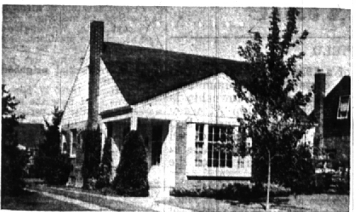

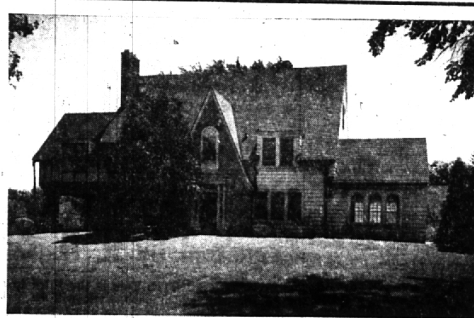
