Announce Missions Speakers

"Mission: Detroit" covers church mission work in the metropolitan Detroit area, and will be presented to Birmingham churchwomen during the afternoon session of their Missionary Institute on October 3. Sponsored by the United Church Women of Birmingham, the institute will feature Mrs. William Tighe's morning discussion on southeast Asia, and "Mission: Detroit," to be shown in the afternoon with commentary by the Rev. Sheldon Rahn.

The annual missionary institute is scheduled from 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at First Methodist church, with luncheon served at noon.

MR. RAHN, DIRECTOR of the Detroit Council of Churches social service department, will present the 30-minute report on Detroit area churches' current home missions, social welfare and social action projects.

The 100 colored slides which tell the story of "Mission: Detroit" were photographed by James C. McDonald, of 450 Westwood drive, Birmingham. McDonald, a Presbyterian layman and industrialist, is also vice president of the Bloomfield Hills camera club.

Mr. Rahn cooperated in the preparation of script and commentary to accompany the slides. The presentation was prepared by the Detroit Council of Churches to assist churchwomen's organizations in their study of "Mission: USA," this year's national study theme for ten million Protestant and Orthodox churchwomen in America.

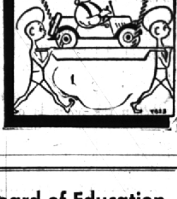

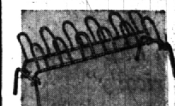
