

Cash Register Bids Tabled for Study

LATHRUP — Council decided Monday night to ask the city's Business Procedure committee to study bids on cash registers and make recommendations on a smaller machine which a representative of Burroughs said would serve the city's needs, at a \$700 saving.

Bids were opened from three companies on large registers. The companies and their bids were: National Cash Register Co., \$1,975; Burroughs, \$1,491; Burroughs, \$1,745 less 10 per cent; and Sweda, \$1,780 less 10 per cent. Burroughs also submitted an alternate bid on a smaller machine which would cost \$922, less 10 per cent.

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S'fld Receives High School Bids

Like many school systems in the area, Southfield Board of Education experienced higher construction costs than anticipated for their new 12 Mile elementary school.

Original estimates were about \$330,000 but when the bids were counted it came to approximately \$362,000 for the 13-classroom building. The low bidders were: general construction, V. Sota and Co., \$264,240; plumbing and heating, J. D. Naylor and Son, \$68,875; electrical, Kemp Brothers, \$29,790; and kitchen equipment, Great Lakes Supply, \$11,454.

These bids are not final, if the board makes some changes and accepts alternates, other bidders will be low.

IN OTHER business Thursday, the board approved the sale of two school buses, no longer needed by the schools, to the Southfield Boy Scouts and Little League.

Agreement was reached with the township to extend the water line along 12 Mile road into the new elementary school site. Cost, estimated at \$15,000, will be carried by the board over a period of years.

Plans are being made for a hayride and square dance also to be held in October. Details will be announced later. The board considered a proposal to construct a larger ice skating rink on Crabapple Commons.

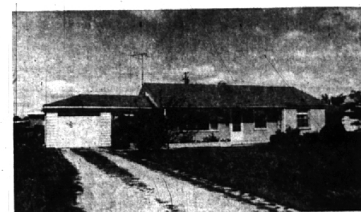
