Diplomas were mailed this month from the University of Michigan to several area students who completed work for their degrees at the end of the summer session.

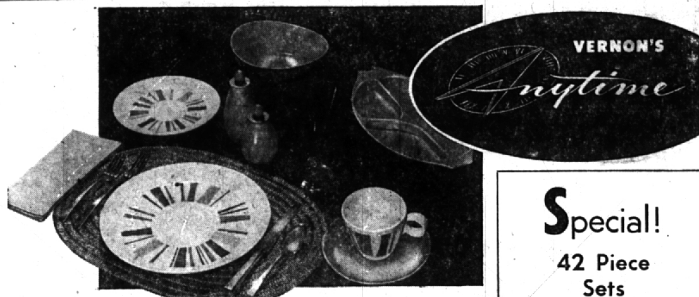

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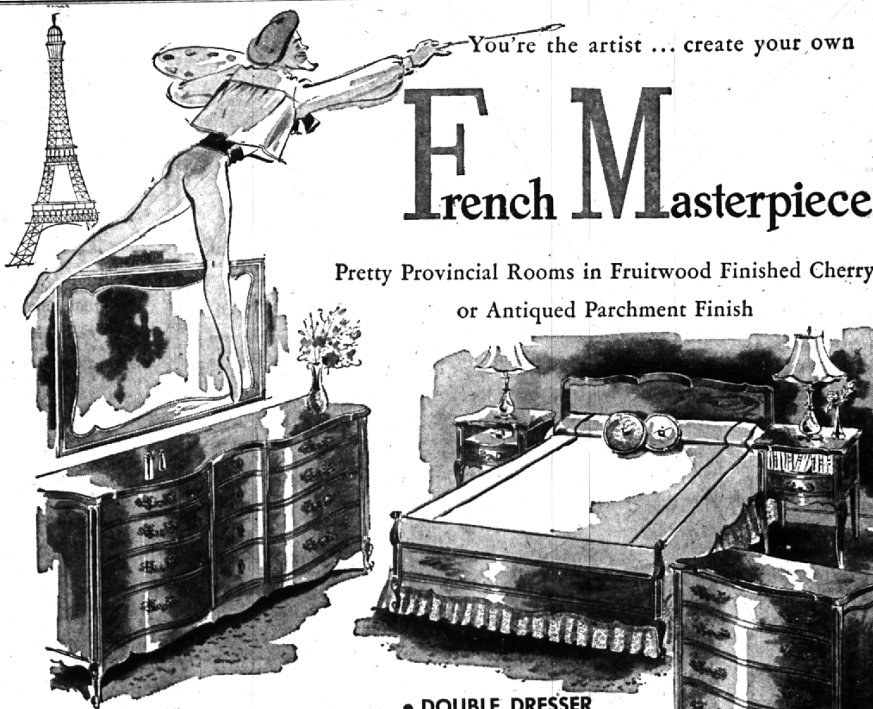
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
