A special student assembly will be held for their first installation.

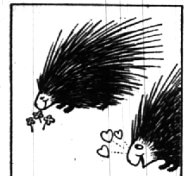

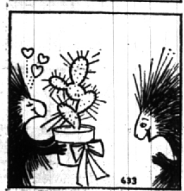

Enrollment Hits Record

CRANBROOK—The four Cranbrook schools opened their classrooms last week with a record number of students in attendance.

Cranbrook school has a total of 360 boys, the highest number in its history. Of this total, 192 are boarding students coming from 18 different states, as well as Germany and Siam. There are also 176 day boys from surrounding communities.

KINGSWOOD school's enrollment reaches 278, the largest number of pupils ever to attend the

school at one time. Resident students include 84 girls from 18 states, two students from Paris and one from Germany. Day girls from Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills total 194.

Both Kingswood and Cranbrook enroll students from the seventh through twelfth grades.

Brookside school has 223 youngsters, both boys and girls from kindergarten level through the sixth grade.

Cranbrook Academy of Art has enrolled 114 students whose homes are scattered all over the globe, including the Orient, Europe, the Philippines, Canada and Israel. Most of these Academy students are studying for either a bachelor's or master's degree in fine arts.
