

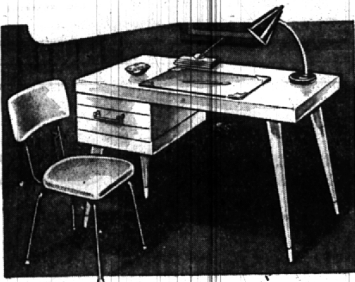
## Makes Dean's List

## Organic vs. Inorganic Gardening

The Brooklyn botanical garden is well known for its interest in the field of scientific horticulture and has sponsored an article by Professor Emil Truog of the University of Wisconsin. This is the conclusion of his extensive study on organic versus inorganic gardening.

"There is no scientific evidence to support the contention that fertility elements in commercial fertilizers, made through the use of strong acids like sulfuric and nitric acids, are toxic to soil bacteria and earthworms," he says.

"There is absolutely no difference between the nitric and sulfuric acids formed in the soil from organic matter and those same acids as used in a fertilizer factory."

PROFESSOR TRUOG recommends that home gardeners use compost or other organic matter to promote better physical condition of the soil and then supplement this with commercial fertilizers... so goes your lesson for today.

Come on, jump in my automobile and let's visit streets. At Warwick drive you see a perfect example of clipping and grooming of lawns. They are placed in excellent taste. Two white spots of geraniums at the front door point up a job well done. They have a fine lawn unbroken by "busy planting."

They have handled their difficult planting challenge well by having all of the evergreens in the elevated planter of the same variety (yew) and they are placed in the box in a measured manner and identically trimmed.
