Changing the pattern which has gone on since 1952, the Birmingham cross country team finally topped the Walled Lake harriers in a dual meet last week.
With Tom Fontaine heading the two-mile route runners in a time of 10:54 the Maples finished in a well placed order to take a 22-17 victory.
Right behind Fontaine was Walled Lake's Charles Wilson in 10:58 with Birmingham's Lynn Renn pressing him in 11 minutes flat. Bill Hillley for the Lakers came in fourth and then, bunched together were a trio of Birmingham cross countrymen, Bob Benson, 11:15, Dick Boyd 11:19, and Bill Landis, 11:20.

AFTER Jim Wilson took eighth position for Walled Lake, three more of coach Ambrose's boys finished in order. Tom Thorson, Gary Schack and Steve Hunter. In downing the Vikings the Maples squad also ended the 19 consecutive dual meet wins posted by Walled Lake over the past four seasons.

Next meet for Birmingham, who are running one of the best teams in the school's history, will be a four school affair against Berkley, Waterford and Spaulding. The Maples runners will be out for the large race, starting at 4 p.m., tomorrow.

Warren Orlick Named Mich. Golf Pro of '56

Warren W. Orlick, 1013 Woodlea dr., Birmingham, popular Detroit district golf professional for the past 26 years, has been named Michigan's Golf Professional of the year. Orlick is the professional at Tam O'Shanter Country club on Orchard Lake and is the president of the Michigan section of the Professional Golfers' Association of America.

The honor was bestowed upon Orlick by a committee composed of James Stanish of Detroit, representing the USGA; Mrs. W. L. McGivern of Grosse Pointe, representing the women's section of the USGA; John Walter, golfing editor of the Detroit News and Joe Devaney, golf professional of Grosse Ile Country club and recipient of the award last year. Orlick will now compete with numerous other golf professionals from around the United States for the title of "PGA Golf Professional of the Year" in the nation.

ORLICK is a popular selection among the state's golf professionals, having devoted his life to the game since 1921 when he caddied at Grosse Ile Country club at the age of eight. A native of Wyandotte, he secured his first job as a professional at Grosse Ile as a shop boy on the staff of Joe Devaney. In 1931 he became an assistant to Wilfred Reid at Indianwood and the following year returned to Grosse Ile as first assistant.

The stocky pro was named head professional at Monroe Country club in 1940 and served until 1943 when he entered the service during World War II. After his discharge in 1945 he returned to Grosse Ile where he was appointed to his present post at Tam in 1953.

BESIDES being president of the Michigan section of the PGA, he is also chairman of the state and eligibility committees of the state association and is national rules chairman and member of the tournament committee. Another position he held was secretary-treasurer of the Michigan section for two years prior to his election to the presidency and at one time or another he has served on every committee in the state PGA.

Well known by many local golfers, Orlick has been very active locally as a speaker before clubs and organizations of the area. He has also done much work in the PGA's rehabilitation project at the former Percy Jones Veterans' Hospital at Battle Creek. Warren has qualified and played in the National PGA golf tournament three times and has a fine competitive record in numerous local and state tournaments.
