Northland Center Opens Animal Land For Kids April 16

Animal land, a complete collection of barnyard animals, from baby chicks through Mexican burros, comes to Northland Shopping center, W. 8 Mile road and North-western highway, starting April 16th for Easter.

Thousands are expected to visit Animal Land which will be housed in a huge 60 by 20 foot tent located in Northland's Great Lake-court.

The animals will be kept in individual pens in the tent, which will be lighted and decorated as a barn. On hand as occupants of Animal Land will be sheep, goats, baby chicks and ducklings; a pony with a newborn colt, a sow with her eight week old piglets, burros, and many other farm and household animals.

YMCA News

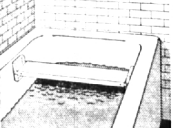
