Beta Sigma Phi Buys Equipment For New Clinic

Birmingham's Eta Lambda chapter of Beta Sigma Phi sorority became the first organization in this area to contribute to The Fund for Crippling Diseases, when it presented a check for \$100 to Sidney Miller, the fund's director of education and public relations. The contribution represented proceeds from the group's recent fashion show.

THE CRIPPLING diseases group has opened to the public a 34-bed research clinic in the Woodward General hospital in Highland Park. It has engaged in extensive research, looking for a means of correcting retarded growth in infants and children, opening a new field in enzyme medicine. The organization's research team has been using young enzymes to stimulate and reactivate normal growth and development of the nerves and muscles.

Beta Sigma Phi's contribution will be used to purchase safety equipment for children attending the clinic. Children enter the clinic for a four-week period, at which time they undergo extensive tests and begin the enzyme treatment. After this, they return home, coming back to the clinic for monthly checkups.

MONEY for the continuation of this program will come from interested groups, and Beta Sigma Phi hopes to continue its support.

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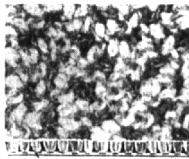
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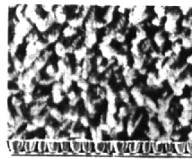
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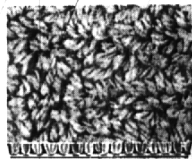
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
