His government is New Deal, Socially which he favors. Stores are sandwiched together within each block, and merchandise is well displayed. Few "bargains" are seen.

FOR CENTURIES Puerto Rico has remained beyond the average traveler's itinerary. The modern airplane has changed all this; between P.R. and the U.S. fly planes of Eastern Airlines, B.W.I.A., Pan American, Caribbean, and perhaps more to come. Costs are reasonable, too. Thus, it is no risk to prophesy that tourist travel will be on the increase indefinitely.

Incidentally, proof of this may be found in the tremendous increase in the cost of desirable seashore and inland areas—often tenfold during the past five to eight years.

San Juan has many noteworthy historical sites, the chief one being more than four-hundred-year-old fort El Morro, which for centuries guarded the Caribbean and Florida Straits Waterways.

BY THE WAY, just 45 miles north of San Juan is the deepest part of the Atlantic Ocean, the 17,922 ft. deep Wukue Trench.

One day we were driven 46 miles from San Juan over winding mountain roads, through lush tropical vegetation, to the El Yunque Rain Forest, a National Park with U.S. Dept. of the Interior uniformed Rangers on the scene.

Plenty of U.S. financial aid is being given here—where it should do more good than in many other areas on this earth that Uncle Sam is a prodigal spender.

SOMETIME I hope again to visit this interesting island. It really is worth seeing, however brief one's stay must be.

My next stop will be in St. Thomas, in the U.S. Virgin Islands—about a half hour's flight from here.

PERHAPS the greatest lure to attract new industry is Puerto Rico's waiving of all taxes on new business for a period of 10 years. The government claims, for example, that new U.S. industries coming to the island earn an average of 16 per cent profit, "three times the U.S. average."

This may be but my own belief is that Puerto Rico's basic problem (like England's) is over-population in relation to its insular national resources. Conditions can be improved, but to be sure, but they never will reach the economic dreams of academicians and opportunist-politicians.

HOWEVER, ONE need to travel only through these West Indies hands-to-learn that practical anthropology can help to raise living standards. Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands offer proof of this fact.

People are friendly and courteous to tourists. Cost of items in Puerto Rico compares with the U.S., some items taking more from your pocketbook.

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To Try New Type Parking Space

An enlarged parking space is going to be tried out by Birmingham city commissioners as a possible method of reducing traffic congestion.
