

\$400 Salary Hike For Hills Faculty

Bloomfield Hills teachers will receive \$400 salary increases in the 1957-58 school budget approved last week by the Hills board of education.

The overall budget was increased almost \$120,000 for a total of \$668,185. The 1956-57 budget was \$538,220.

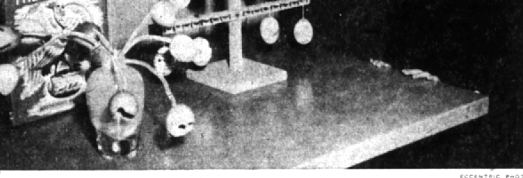
Three-quarters of the increase, said Supt. Eugene L. Johnson, will be used for teacher salary raises. On the new schedule, beginning teachers with bachelor degrees will receive \$4,000, plus in 15 steps to a maximum of \$7,000. Teachers with master degrees will start at \$4,800 and advance to \$7,200. Previous starting salaries were \$4,200 and \$4,400.

THE BOARD also granted four high school teachers extra pay for additional work loads. In announcing this departure from the single salary schedule, Johnson pointed out that the district is "one of the last to break away from the single system."

Remainder of the budget increase is earmarked for increased operating expenses and office and maintenance personnel.

Approval of the new budget, Johnson pointed out, puts Bloomfield Hills school system in the top 25 per cent in salary schedules in the state.

The veteran Detroit newspaperman, who retired from the Detroit News in 1941, died Tuesday in St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, at the age of 74.

**Condemnation
Delay May Mean
Smaller School**

MR. GORE and his wife, the former Helen Fern, Robinson, made their home at 1235 Yorkshire, Birmingham, and had lived in this area since 1919. Besides Mrs. Gore, two sons, John R. of Chardon, O., and Donald of Birmingham, also survive.

Born in London, Ont., Gore came to Detroit as a boy. Robinson, made old Central high school and the Detroit College of Law, quitting to become a newspaperman.

After jobs as police reporter for the Buffalo Evening Times, Detroit Free Press and the old Detroit Tribune, he started with the Detroit News in 1906. He worked with the Chicago Daily News, returning to The Detroit News in 1941. He remained with them until his retirement in 1951.

HIS FIRST big story came early in his career when he witnessed the assassination of President McKinley, phoned the editor of the Buffalo Times, and was asked to cover it for them.

Performing a variety of chores for the News over the years, Gore traveled widely and was one of the first reporters to take pictures to illustrate his own stories. At the time of his retirement, he was editor of the Magazine Page of The News.

JOSEPH V. MARTIN, 67, of 1512 East Bennaville, died Wednesday at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital. Born Nov. 6, 1889, in LeRoy, N.Y., he moved to Birmingham in 1925 from Mr. Clemens. At the time of his death, he was produce manager for National Food Store in Birmingham. He was with them for 33 years.

Mr. Martin was on the board at the first Methodist church, where he was a member of its ushers' club and men's club.

Surviving are his wife, Lora, four daughters, Mrs. R. F. Scott of Saginaw, Mrs. Edward Siemer of Hot Springs, D. C., Mrs. C. Coss of Fernside and Mrs. William Kish of Oak Park; a brother, Louis Martin of Mohridge, S. D., and 11 grandchildren.

Dr. Harry O. Martin officiated at services Saturday from Manley Bailey funeral home. Burial was at Roseland Park.

**SCHOOLS TO OFFER
Driver Training
Summer Sessions**

Driver training classes will be offered at Birmingham high school during the summer months. The sessions will be held in 10-day increments from June 24 to July 10, the second from July 11 to July 22 to August 6.

Morning and afternoon classes will be offered to a class until 10 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m. Behind the wheel instruction will be scheduled in three one-hour sessions.

To be eligible, students must reside in the school district and be at least 15 years of age at start of session.

Preference will be given to students who are 15 1/2 years of age or older. Those between the ages of 14 and 15 1/2 will be placed on a waiting list.

Students presently enrolled in Birmingham high school will sign up and register with their counselors. All others will clear through the principal's office. No student will be admitted to a class until proper registration is completed, including both the parent's signature and verification of eligibility by school record, birth certificate or baptismal record. Sign-up must be for a complete session only. Adjustments cannot be made for personal vacations.
