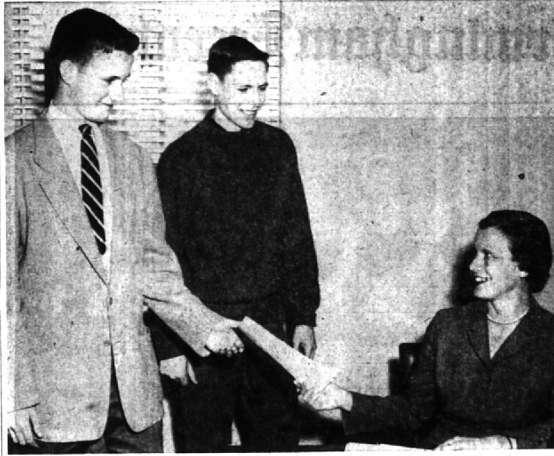

loves to talk of painting, has definite ideas on this subject.

"If there is no commercial value there is no artistic value," said Coppin, who, says his critics, is "too commercial." "All great art should appeal to all people," counters Coppin.

Coming back to the "antique auto" series, Coppin says that he is not through with this phase of his career and has several ideas which he plans to put on canvas.

Coppin admits that his series was an outgrowth of his envy of painters such as Frederic Remington and John Singer Sargent who were able to contribute much

to American history with their paintings of early frontier life.

WHY NOT a series on pioneer autos, thought Coppin? And so was born an idea that was responsible for placing three of these paintings of early autos in the Detroit Historical Museum, including the original of the reproduction on this page.

"I've always felt that Sargent was the man to beat," said Coppin reflectively.

If popularity of an artist's paintings are any barometer, John S. Coppin is the man for other artists to beat.

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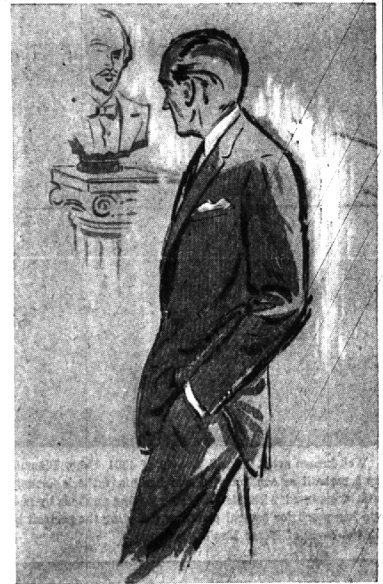
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
