## Public Hearing May 6 on Troy's \$599,848 Budget

TROY — Public hearing on the city's \$599,848 budget for 1957-58 was set for May 6 by city commission Monday night.

Up almost 50 per cent over last year's \$405,000 budget, the estimated cost of city government represents an increase in service standards and reflects a population growth, said City Manager C. R. Lukens.

Because of \$42,000 surplus in the general fund and \$71,000 excess in the highway budget, the enlarged budget will mean little or no tax increases to the average homeowner, Lukens said.

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
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
